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## Dave Shuklis Models Acquired! Long Lost, 18 Models Are Now At the Museum

n the history of the model car hobby, a few names shine above other modelers as examples of craftsmanship, willing teachers anxious to aquaint others with their skills, and pleasant representatives of the hobby.

Of all of the names of the "First Generation" in the model car hobby (roughly the time from 1956 through the mid Sixties), the name of Dave Shuklis stands nearly alone. Though burdened with muscular dystrophy, Dave was named as the Technical Editor of the historic Car Model magazine. Dave's models pioneered many of the techniques still not common today: working doors, operational convertible tops, roll up windows and other techniques. Though Dave succumbed to his disease in 1972, his legacy for risk taking and expert craftmanship has survived.

With his death, Dave's collection of remarkable models disappeared from view. For a time, many of Dave's models were displayed at <u>Auto World</u> where many enjoyed them. Later, the July-August 1983 issue of <u>Scale Auto Enthusiast</u> magazine carried a fine historical on Dave and his models, featuring many of them. After that, only a few modlers knew of the models and they disappeared once again.

Enter Oscar Koveleski, co-founder and co-editor of Car Model magazine and founder of Auto World. In late 1994, he contacted Museum founder Mark S. Gustavson, speaking of the possibility that the Museum might acquire the entire surviving Shuklis collection. After a few letters and a phone calls, Ed Shuklis, Dave's father, graciously agreed (Continued on Column Two)

to donate all of his son's models to the Museum.

Subsequently, on August 3, 1995, Museum supporter Norman Veber made an eight hour round trip (travelling over 400 miles) to pick up the models. After a pleasant 45 minute conversation with the elder Shuklis, Norm left for home, the unopened box of models in hand.

When he got the unopened box home, Norm discovered that, among other pieces, the Shamrock, the Red Rev-er and the Bob Tailed Cat as well as 13 others, were in the box. Remarkably, almost every model was in excellent condition though all need a thorough cleaning. Norm removed the worst of the accumulated dust and carefully packed the models and then shipped this most significant collection Museum. Once a careful list has (Continued on Column Three)

been made, all of the models will be repaired and placed in a special permanent display in the Museum, along with the many trophies that Dave was awarded for his terrific work. Full hobby press coverage will be forthcoming.

A special thanks to Oscar Koveleski, Norm Veber and Mark S. Gustavson for their hard work in acquiring this very signficant collection for the Museum.

#### Restoration Help Needed!

When Museum Trustees recently canvassed the collection of models in the Museum, it became clear that a lot of help is needed from qualified modelers to restore many of the models to their original condition.

Not only will some of the Shuklis models need repair, but the models of Jim Keeler (like the X-100 and the famous "Turbine Tub") need significant work. And, thanks to the wonderful generosity of Kay Barnett, we have about a dozen of the departed Bob Barnett's wonderful customs that need repair. In some cases, a full paint job is needed; in other examples, a thorough cleaning and polishing is only needed. In all cases, careful work and an attention to detail is needed.

Because of the great importance of these items, the Museum is interested in securing the help of interested and dedicated hobbyists. There is no fee for your work, and you must provide all of the materials needed (shipping charges will be reimbursed). Already, Gary Grassman and a few other Texas modelers are working on some of the Barnett customs, and Bill "Uncle Bill" Aitchison will be signed up soon.

If you want to help, please submit to the Museum a resume and a statement describing your interest and ability to complete the project. The hobby needs your assistance!

## Thousands of Decal and Instruction Sheets to go on display!

One of the most important aspects of the collection of the National Model Car Builders' Museum is the collection of thousands of instructions sheets and decals.

Collected from donors from throughout the United State and Canada, the *entire* collection of decals and instruction sheets literally chronicles the last 38 years of the hobby. The decals are entrancing, with items from Ed Roth, Budd "The Kat" Anderson, George Barris decals and plenty of other "personality" decals.

The Museum has been presented with a problem, though: The documents were deteriorating rapidly in the dry Utah climate. Never printed on high-quality paper, it was clear to the Trustees that the time would come when everything would simply deteriorate into crumbs if something wasn't done.

After thinking about possible solutions, Trustee Alan Raab generously agreed to laminate everything in clear plastic to preserve them for the future.

When completed, the hundreds of sheets will be placed in a large "parts counter"-type three ring binder with an accompanying index which will permit interested visitors or researchers to examine the hundreds of fascinating items.

The display will be ready for public viewing in early Fall 1995.
