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Museum to Participate in Major California Auto Art Show: More Public Awareness.

he Museum has been invited to participate in a major custom car and hot rod show in California this Fall by loaning the famed Oakland Roadster Show Diorama for a 4-month display. The Oakland Museum, in Oakland, California, will host over 30 vintage vehicles for a presentation that will start on September 21, 1996 and ends on January 4, 1997. Entitled, "Hot Rods and Customs: The Men and Machines of California's Car Culture", the exhibition will honor and people and display many of the vehicles that had a tremendous influence on the social and business aspects of hobbyists' lives since the Fifties.

The Diorama will be transported to the Oakland Museum in mid-September in a large rented Ford extended Econoline van for the two day trip. The Oakland Museum has agreed to provide full insurance for the Diorama, as well as covering all expenses relating to the exhibition of the Oakland Roadster Show Diorama. Bob Wick, Mark Benton and Mark S. Gustavson met with Oakland Museum representative Mike Dobrin in late January to tie up the arrangements.

To the uninitiated, the Diorama project was started in 1989, and completed in 1992, by a group of modelers from across the United States. After three years of very hard work, the Diorama made its spectacular debut at the Thirteenth Annual GSL International Model Car Championship in 1993 where it was critically acclaimed.

help from Bob Wick, Mark S. Gustavson and Bob Barnett, the Diorama also enjoyed the support of dozens of modelers from across the United States, Canada and Australia as well as the sponsorship of major aftermarket companies like Evergreen Strip Styrene and R&D Unique. 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Big News: Museum Video Tour Out Soon!

In response to many requests from hobbyists everywhere, the National Model Car Builders' Museum has announced that a 1-hour video tour will be available later this year for a donation in the range of \$20.00 plus postage.

Long in the planning stage, the tour will feature the camera work of Dale Angell who is an associate professor of film at the University of Utah. The creative mind behind Madame Woo productions — which has created many railroad films seen on PBS channels across the United States — Dale has long been a supporter of the Museum.

The tour video must await the receipt and installation of four new custom-made model display cabinets being presented built by Museum Trustee Alan Raab. Additionally, the video must be delayed until the completion of a major renovation of the Museum which will include a fresh coat of paint and carpeting! We want the Museum to be at its best when seen in the video.

The tour will be fashioned as a "walk through" view of the Museum which will include elements from the extensive library, the Oakland Roadster Show Diorama, the filing cabinets, the display cases (with the newly created nameplates and index tabs), the Dioramas, the vintage paints/ putties/vintage parts paks, the thousand-item decals, artwork, box art models, the famous Kallen "Moose Hat", and dozens of other items.

Advance orders are not being taken at the present time, but the next newsletter will detail the way in which a copy can be reserved. It is hoped that this project will better get the word out on the Museum!

Museum Services to Public

n response to the desire of hobbyists to better understand the history of the model car hobby, and to more broadly share the information in the collection, the Museum will offer, by June 1, 1997, the following services and products:

1). The "Guide to Establishing Model Car Clubs" "Sample Model Car Club Constitution." and "Model Car Contest Judging Sheet' will be available to interested hobbyists for a \$5.00 donation plus a large 9x11" envelope with \$2.00 postage attached; and A copying service for any model car publication in the collection. The hobbyist must specifically identify the magazine title, month and year of the issue, and page number. The cost is \$1.00 per page plus a large 9x11" envelope with \$2.00 postage attached;

3). A search service of all Museum computer indexes for any hobbyist name, article title, manufacturer data and any other bit of memorabilia. The Museum will then copy all non-restricted information for a cost of \$1.00 per page, plus a minimum \$10.00 research charge for the first half hour (time in excess of that invoiced). Obviously, the success of each request is limited by the information and documents on hand. All hobbyists will also need to include a large 9x11" envelope with \$2.00 postage attached./

As these services are offered, and as hobbyists envision new requests for information not previously considered, the Museum will do its best to respond. Please also keep in mind that the Museum is open to on-site research by anyone who wishes to visit the Museum. All copying charges would apply.

New Equipment on Site, Plea for Additional Help!

The Museum's mission to chronicle, disseminate information concerning, and displaying video tapes about, the history of the model car hobby can be best achieved by having on hand the equipment necessary to pursue those goals. Historically, Alan Raab donated a television and then four years ago, Roy Sorenson donated a used but very functional video tape recorder. In early 1993, an old client of Mark S. Gustavson contributed a used 8088 computer onto which the enormous Museum inventory was loaded and made subject to a retrieval program designed by Museum computer consultant Mark Benton.

However, at this point, the Museum is in need of some additional equipment.

1). The old 8088 computer is grossly inadequate to meet the requirements of the new data retrieval program that Mark Benton has created to manage the burgeoning Museum inventory program. The Museum has purchased a (cheap!) used 386 computer but it needs to be upgraded with a 486 chip and added memory. Estimated cost: \$400.00; and 2). We need a portable clothes hanger stand so that we can display the two dozen-odd vintage event jackets and T-Shirts. Presently, we have no place to display the same; and 3) We need a piece of furniture large enough to accomodate the placement of the television and video tape player and a stand on which the donated copy machine can be placed; and 4) We need a combination telephone and phone answering device (line to be installed in early 1997); 5) We need 5 reams of high quality copy paper plus some toner for the Canon copier recently donated by Mark S. Gustavson (please write for specific specifications).

With all of the current emphasis upon the wonderful and wild array of sophisticated aftermarket products and highly-detailed kits, what about the past? What was it like to build a Please help out! What an opportunity to build kit in the early Sixties? We all enjoy wonderful new lacquers and acrylic paints, but what was it like to use the old AMT lacquers? How many times have you reached for a modern instant glue (withs accelerator, no less!), forgetting what it was like to use vintage Revell tube glue or Testors' solvent. We celebrate the new catalyzed polyester resin putties which don't shrink, "bleed through", and set up rapidly, but what about the old AMT tube putty, the smell of which wasted through rooms when were all kids.

Later this year, the Museum will offer to all model car publications an article in which Mark S. Gustavson will construct, and Mike Barlow will chronicle through exhaustive photography, a vintage, NOS AMT 1961 Falcon Ranchero kit using parts from the companion Ranchero Styline kit. In a recent acquisition, the Museum acquired two mint, SOFT tubes of AMT putty. We also have several duplicate cans of vintage AMT lacquers (courtesy of long-time Canadian Museum supporter Dick Groenheide) which will be used. No part or paint, or other supply, newer than 1963, will be used! This should be quite a visit into the newsletter, we will start to pass along some past as we literally revisit the early days of our hobby. When completed, the model will be displayed at major model car events across the country. Any ideas? Send them in!!

IRS Tax Deductible Status Coming in late 1996!

Many people have asked, "Can I take a deduction on my taxes for my contributions up to the Museum?" Up to this point, the answer has been a resounding "NO."

However, substantial efforts have been underway to qualify the Museum as a "public educational institution" under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. An application has been made to the Service in order to secure tax deductible status to all donors (the Museum has always been a non-profit Utah Corporation). It is anticipated that approval will be received by late Summer, 1996. Until then, NO deductions should be taken for any contributions made at any time.

REVELL Original '55, '56 and '57 Chevies in first issue boxes.

Section Six: Spare Parts. Odd as it might sound, we are also looking for spare stock, custom, hot rod and competition parts left over from kits that modelers have completed in the last 40 years. We desperately need these parts to restore Museum cars and to eventually create a display of vintage parts. We are also interested in receiving large boxes of unattached parts or individual items.
